Elements of Drama

Part 1



- Acts are the major divisions in a dramatic work
- In performance, the end of an act is often signaled by the lowering of the curtain

- Modern plays tend to have 1-3 acts
- Older plays tend to 4-5 acts (Shakespeare always had 5)

Scenes

- Scenes are smaller divisions within acts
- There is no minimum or maximum when it comes to the number of scenes
- A common way to reference a specific location in a play is by listing the act.scene.line
- Example: 1.5.34
 Act I, Scene 5, Line 34

Stage Directions

 Instructions by a playwright to the actors and director that tell how to stage and perform a play

- At the beginning of the play as the "setting"—describes the set
- Peppered throughout text to inform character action, set movement, etc.

Cast of Characters

- A list that tells who is in the play
- May also, briefly describe the characters

- Lists all characters, including extras
- Unnamed Extras are always listed in order of appearance

Chorus

 A group of actors who speak together with one voice and describe and comment on the main action of the play Sometimes, as in *Romeo and Juliet* the Chorus can be a single person
