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Overview

Global Folklore explores multiple strands of folklore from across the world. Guided by the teacher through universal themes, students will leave with a broader view of how the cultures of the world are connected through their folklore. This will be accomplished through literary analysis, research, and discussion.

This course is an accepted college entrance requirement course. A grade of "C" or above will be needed if you plan to attend an OUS school. It is highly recommended that a student with a "D" grade in a required college entrance course meet with a counselor to discuss if that course will have to be retaken.

General Philosophy

In my classroom, both you and I are bound by this philosophy. There is no double standard or special dispensation available.

Class Materials

Please remember to bring all materials (especially paper) with you every day. This should include at least one pen and pencil. **A three-ring binder and loose-leaf paper is required**.

You have no official class textbook, but we will be reading from several works throughout the semester. All materials will either be available in class or online.

Assignments

You will be responsible for all assignments given over the course of the year. 70% of your total grade will come from the summative projects over the course of the semester (about two per unit). 30% of your total grade will come from the formative activities that occur throughout the semester (daily assignments and homework).

Classroom Norms

- 1. Respect yourself, your peers, and the learning environment, in the traditional and online classroom.
- 2. Use strong interpersonal communication skills with peers and the teacher--this includes showing up to class in person or online classes ready and willing to present work.
- 3. Be caring and honest, demonstrating integrity through digital citizenship and a strong work ethic.
- 4. Students are expected to always follow school rules and will face appropriate consequences as outlined by the district in the handbook, in addition to consequences from the classroom teacher.

Electronic devices are not to be used during class time. That means either for phone calls, messages, or music. Students will have to meet with one of our behaviour specialists if they refuse to put their device away during class. On rare occasions, teacher may give students permission to listen to music (one ear bud only) while working on longer activities.

Unit projects can include in-class time, but most of the work will need to be completed as homework. You will always have 1-3 weeks to complete unit projects. All assignments must be turned in on the specified date to receive prompt feedback.

All formative activities must be completed and submitted by the end of their respective units.

Academic Honesty/Cheating

Cheating includes, but is not limited to, looking at others' tests, copying someone else's work, turning in papers from the Internet as your own, merely rewording from the Internet, or allowing someone to copy off of you.
