Haiku

 Haiku: a short poetic form from Japan, which consists of three lines of 5, 7, and 5 syllables, and must invoke nature in some way. Haiku do not rhyme.

Example:

The fifth small sparrow alighting on the plum branch scatters the first four.



Note: Syllable count gets lost in translation:

Tanka

Tanka: a Japanese poetic form, which consists of five lines of 5, 7, 5, 7, and 7 syllables. Unlike haiku, tanka often display personal feelings and use figurative language (metaphor, symbol, etc.). As with haiku, tanka do not rhyme.

Example: The fifth small sparrow alighting on the plum branch scatters the first four, focused on the seed I left, heedless of hawks overhead.
